



## Our Story: NZSO musicians and their instruments

#### **Donald Armstrong**

First Violin, Associate Concertmaster

The violin I play was made around 1754 by Nicolo Gaglinao in Naples, Italy. I bought it around 1990, and it belonged to Malcolm Latchem from St Martin-in-the-Fields in the UK.

It went to NZSO Principal First Violinist Valerie Rigg in the 1960s in a divorce settlement, and she then sold it to NZSO Assistant Concertmaster John Chisholm. John sadly died in his early 30s and the violin remained in a bank vault. His widow, Vivien Chisholm, offered it to me to try a few years after I joined the NZSO. It was an incredibly big thing to trust me with the instrument. I remember hearing John play it so beautifully at the funeral of former Concertmaster Alex Lindsay. I am forever grateful that I play the violin of such a lovely man who helped and mentored me in my early days in the Orchestra. It is just gorgeous to play, with a slightly throaty luscious sound, and it records beautifully. Instruments are bound up with their owners.

You can imagine from the previous owners of my violin the emotions that can accompany an instrument.

It is really important to have great string instruments in an orchestra to give quality and complexity to the sound. My own violin is tied up with the history of the NZSO, and I am really proud of its legacy.



#### Ken Ichinose

Associate Principal, Cello

I play an unnamed cello, made circa 1780 in Italy. I acquired it in London in 2017 after initially borrowing it during a trip back. I loved it so much that I knew I had to try and buy it. The previous owner was Bernhard Braunholz, a prominent German cellist who played in the Kehr Trio during the 1960s and can be heard on recordings the trio made at that time. I feel very fortunate to own this cello myself. It has that distinctive old Italian sound that leaves a lasting impression on the listener.

After six years of playing this cello, I still look forward to hearing its sound every day and feel privileged to be able to rely on it when performing with the NZSO.

#### **Malcolm Struthers**

**Double Bass** 

Thomas Kennedy is regarded as one of the best of the English school of makers that flourished in the early 19th Century, his basses are regarded as some of the greatest instruments ever made. My bass is recognisable for its distinctive dark varnish, which is a feature of Kennedy's work. The Kennedy has been played in the NZSO since 1970 when Bob Berg joined the bass section. When he retired, Dale Gold bought the bass and played it in the NZSO until he retired in 2005. I have an abiding image of Dale playing this bass; for me, the Kennedy will always be associated with him. I was fortunate to be able to buy the Kennedy from Dale. He was my teacher, mentor and friend, so to play his instrument is something very special to me.

The sound of the bass is quite special, too, powerful and dark. It adds a wonderful depth to the sound of the bass section.
